#### **Summary**

The 16 men in the class of 1912 were primarily from Massachusetts, with two students from Maine and one student each from Canada, England and Ireland. About half of them had only completed grammar school; many attended higher-level schools but did not graduate, but many also went back to school after leaving for a period of time, mainly because they started working. Four students studied law before enrolling at Suffolk Law School, 2 of them informally and 2 at other law schools (YMCA Law School and Boston University Law School). The graduates came from a variety of industries, including manufacturing, farming, real estate, house painting and insurance. Their occupational industries after graduating from law school also varied and included printing, insurance, mail service, clerical work and the military. At least 4 graduates – Joseph Abbott, Clarence Bosworth, Michael Horan and John Howard – went on to practice law.

#### **Summary**

Of the 12 men in the class of 1913, 7 were from Massachusetts and the other 5 were from New Hampshire, Ireland (2 graduates), Canada and Jamaica. Thaddeus Alexander Kitchener, who was born in Jamaica, is believed to be the first Suffolk Law School graduate of African descent. About half of the graduates had only completed grammar school; several attended higher-level schools but did not graduate. Many left school to work before they were able to graduate high school. Only one student (John Murphy) studied law before attending Suffolk Law School; he completed a commercial law course at the former Bryant and Stratton School. According to their applications, none of the graduates had resumed their educations after first leaving, but 3 students indicated that they had educated themselves to some extent. John Haley noted that his education after leaving Lawrence (Mass.) Grammar School consisted of "reading papers, books and anything that I could interest myself in." At least 7 of the 12 graduates became lawyers.

## **Summary**

The 13 men in the class of 1914 were from a variety of locations, including as far away as Minnesota in the United States, as well as Canada, England and Romania. Only 2 graduates have been documented as being from Massachusetts, but demographic information was not found for 4 graduates. Two men of African American descent graduated this year: George Madison Washington, who was born in Virginia, and Louis Eugene Pasco, who was born in Maryland and was also half Mexican. These two graduates are believed

to be the first of African American descent, and Pasco is believed to be the first of Hispanic descent. More graduates completed high school than completed only grammar school. While none had graduated from college before enrolling at Suffolk Law School, 3 took college-level courses. Their reasons for discontinuing their studies were mostly financial: they had to work, they had to support their families and/or they just couldn't afford to go to school anymore. None had studied law before enrolling at Suffolk. The graduates came from a variety of industries, including agriculture, banking, business, hospitality and shoemaking. Their occupational industries after graduating also varied and included banking, hospitality and sales. At least 3 graduates became lawyers, one of them also serving as a justice of the peace. At least one graduate, Frederick Dugdale, became a physician. Two of the graduates completed their studies in less than four years: Philip Rosenblum, who was admitted in January of 1912; and Hiram Skinner, who was admitted in September of 1911.

#### **Summary**

The 22 men in the class of 1915 were mainly from the northeast region of the United States, with the exception of 2 graduates from Ireland (Richard Flynn and William McCarthy) and 1 graduate from Russia (Harry Burroughs). The majority of the graduates (14) were from Massachusetts. More than half of the 1915 graduates had completed high school, and three had completed college. Many of them continued their studies after leaving grammar or high school, several informally by studying on their own and several formally by taken courses at local institutions such as Bryant and Stratton Commercial College and the Boston YMCA. Two graduates had studied law before enrolling at Suffolk, both at law offices. A third graduate, James Currin, had previously studied law at Suffolk Law School for one year, but it is unclear when he first enrolled or why he left. At least 5 of the graduates were admitted in 1912 and completed their studies in 3 years. The graduates came from a variety of industries, including business, engineering, plumbing and teaching. Their occupational industries after graduating also varied and included engineering, insurance, law, mail service and photography. Richard Flynn served as Deputy Commissioner of State Aid and Pensions for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. At least 8 graduates practiced law. Thomas Vreeland Jones, who was born in New Jersey and was of African American descent, now has a Suffolk University Law School scholarship given in his memory from a fund set up by his family and friends to provide financial assistance to deserving minority law students.

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
