Description: *The Boston Chinatown Neighborhood Center* is located in the heart of Boston's Asian American community, midway between Chinatown and the South End. Back in 1969, Boston was in the midst of a school building boom. Within each new school, the city planned space for a community center. In Chinatown and the South End, residents formed the Quincy School Community Council (QSCC). The goal of the Council was to make sure the community had a say in the design of the new school planned for their neighborhood.

In 1976, when the Quincy Community School was completed, the city designated the QSCC to run the community center at the school. In 1997, to more accurately reflect its mission, the agency changed its name to the Boston Chinatown Neighborhood Center. During its history, the agency grew to meet community needs. Today the BCNC serves over 4,000 children, teens and adults each year. The agency prides itself on the quality of its services, the leadership of its board of directors, and the dedication of its staff.

Description: *Heifer* helps a community group analyze their situation. They ask: What do we need? What are our resources? What would we like to see happen in five years? Then, they plan specific activities to achieve their goals. At this point, the Heifer "living loan" becomes reality. Farmers prepare for their animals by participating in training sessions, building sheds, and sometimes planting trees and grasses. Then the livestock arrives - bringing with it the benefits of milk, wool, draft power, eggs and offspring to pass on to another farmer. Finally, the group evaluates its progress, and the cycle repeats as the group moves to more and more ambitious goals, each time visioning, deciding, implementing and reflecting.

Every family and community that receives assistance promises to repay their living loan by donating one or more of their animal's offspring to another family in need. This practice of "passing on the gift" ensures project sustainability, develops community and enhances self-esteem by allowing project partners to become donors. This is Heifer's sustainable approach to ending hunger and poverty - one family, one animal at a time. It's not temporary relief. It's not a handout. It's securing a future with generations of people who have hope, health and dignity.

Description: The ninety volunteers in the *JVC: East* live in sixteen cities. Most work and live in inner-city environments with people from a wide range of ethnic and racial backgrounds. Poverty, homelessness, racism, addiction, abuse, unemployment, and lack of housing and quality education are prevalent. East Coast cities are often a patchwork of ethnic neighborhoods and diverse peoples-eclectic and textured locales providing an abundance of historical and cultural resources.

National and international institutions on the East Coast draw people from around the world engaged in social activism, providing unique opportunities for the *JVC: East* volunteers to participate in important social movements.

In Boston, New York City, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and Washington, D.C., the volunteers are immersed in vibrant, densely populated neighborhoods within cities where there is stark contrast between those with wealth and power and those with great need. Smaller cities like Syracuse, New York; Lowell, Massachusetts; Hartford and Bridgeport, Connecticut; and Newark, Jersey City, and Camden, New Jersey, are hard hit economically, and have fewer resources and less public attention.

These smaller cities provide a unique, manageable vantage point on urban life, politics, and culture. *JVC: East's* northern -most point, Portland, Maine, is a beautiful ocean-side city where homelessness and unemployment are increasing. To the south and towards milder climes, Richmond, Virginia, and Raleigh, North Carolina, have a complex blend of urban, rural, and migrant poverty.

The *PMC*, presented by the Boston Red Sox, is the nation's original fundraising bike-a-thon and today raises more money than any other athletic fundraising event in the country. It is also the most cost efficient. With nearly 94 cents of each dollar raised going directly to the Jimmy Fund, the PMC has contributed more than \$102 million to lifesaving cancer research and treatment at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute since its 1980 inception. On August 7 and 8, 2004, nearly 4,000 cyclists will travel six different routes, logging between 89 and 192 miles over one or two days, through 46 scenic Massachusetts towns from Sturbridge and Wellesley to Bourne and Provincetown. Their goal is to raise \$17 million, elevating the PMC's total Jimmy Fund donation to nearly \$120 million.
