Library Databases

The Sawyer Library subscription periodical indexes and full-text resources are available to current Suffolk University students and faculty.

Contains back runs of over 700 scholarly publications in various academic fields. Search by category or within a particular journal.

[LEXIS/NEXIS. Primary Sources in U.S. History](#)

Provides primary and secondary sources in African American History and Women's History. Includes manuscripts, speeches, laws, court cases, photographs, and secondary articles.

"Published annually since 1972, the Historic Documents Series now contains 32 volumes of primary sources. Each volume includes approximately one hundred documents covering the most

significant events of the year. These documents range from presidential speeches, international agreements, and Supreme Court decisions to U.S. governmental reports, scientific findings, and cultural discussions." Browse by title, topic, or index term or search the database.

This primary document database provides over 96,740 documents including letters, diaries, oral histories, and other personal narratives. Focus is on North America.

A full-text database with more than 5,500 full-text periodicals, including more than 4,600 peer-reviewed journals. Covers all academic subjects, including history.

Provides full text of hundreds of journals, books and other sources. Includes all data from American Humanities Index and Humanities International Index plus other full text content.

Academic OneFile is Gale's major source for peer-reviewed, full-text articles. It provides extensive coverage in all academic subjects and offers millions of articles in both PDF and HTML full-text. Offers extensive coverage of the physical sciences, technology, medicine, social sciences, the arts, theology, literature and other subjects.

Contains a massive database of worldwide general, legal, health, and business news. Provides full-text searching of newspapers, trade journals, wire services, and transcripts of broadcasts. Business, legal, medical, and reference sections are included. Newspaper coverage generally starts in the late eighties or early nineties.

On the night of April 18, 1775, Paul Revere left his home in Boston's North End and began a journey that would make him a legend. The home was first built about 1680. When Paul Revere bought the home in 1770, a third story had been added to the 90-year-old building. Today Revere's home is still standing at 19 North Square and has become a national historic landmark.

"Seven of the eight privately, municipally and federally owned and managed historic sites that comprise Boston National Historical Park are connected by the Freedom Trail, a 2.5-mile (4km) walking tour of 16 sites and structures of historic importance in downtown Boston and Charlestown." See the [Granary Burial Ground](#) for tombstones of famous Americans, such as John Hancock, Paul Revere, James Otis, Robert Treat Paine, and Samuel Adams.

The sites are linked by the 1.6 mile (2.5 km) Black Heritage Trail®. Augustus Saint-Gaudens', memorial to Robert Gould Shaw and the African-American Massachusetts 54th Regiment, stands on the trail." Buildings include the [African Meeting House](#), the oldest standing Black church, the [Abiel Smith School](#), the first schoolhouse in America built to educate Black school children, and the [John J. Smith House](#), home of a abolitionist, and state legislator who lived at 86 Pinckney Street in the 1860s and 1870s. Lewis Hayden (1815-1859), an escaped Kentucky slave, settled in Boston with his wife Harriet in 1849, and their home is the most well-known of Boston's Underground Railroad stations. The Hayden House is located in the Boston African American National Historic Site which includes 15 pre-Civil War buildings relating to the history of Boston's 19th century African American community.

"Frederick Law Olmsted (1822-1903) is recognized as the founder of American landscape architecture and the nation's foremost parkmaker." Park resources include the "Fairsted" historic landscape and a century-old design office. Within the office complex are nearly 1,000,000 original design records detailing work on many of America's famous landscapes, such as the U. S. Capitol and White House Grounds; Great Smoky Mountains and Acadia National Parks; Yosemite Valley; New York's Central Park; and whole park systems in cities such as Seattle, Boston, and Louisville. Currently closed for renovations.

The modest house at 83 Beals Street in Brookline was the first home shared by the president's father and mother, Joseph P. and Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy. It is open to visitors Wednesday through Sunday.
