

World History Resource Guide

Periodical Indexes & Full-text Databases

The Sawyer Library subscription periodical indexes and full-text resources are available to current Suffolk University faculty and students.

[Academic Search Complete](#)

A full-text database with more than 5,500 full-text periodicals, including more than 4,600 peer-reviewed journals. Covers all academic subjects, including history journals.

[Academic OneFile \(InfoTrac\)](#)

Contains citations and full-text articles which cover history, current events, sociology, and humanities. Coverage is from 1980 to the present.

[JSTOR](#)

Contains back runs of over 300 scholarly publications in various academic fields. Search by category or within a particular journal.

[Biography Resource Center](#)

Combines over 400,000 biographies from over 90 Gale Group reference sources. Includes the complete *Marquis Who's Who* and full-text articles from 250 magazines.

[LEXIS/NEXIS Academic](#)

Contains a massive database of worldwide general, legal, health, and business news. Provides full-text searching of newspapers, trade journals, wire services, and transcripts of broadcasts. Business, legal, medical, and reference sections are included. Newspaper coverage generally starts in the late eighties or early nineties.

[Project Muse](#)

Provides full-text scholarly journals of the Johns Hopkins University Press and its publishing partners. Journal categories include economics, history, literature, and philosophy.

[The New York Times \(1851-2001\)](#)

This database offers searchable full-text and full-image articles from the New York Times from 1851 through 2001. The database includes digital reproductions of every page from every issue in downloadable PDF files.

[Humanities International Complete](#)

Provides full text of hundreds of journals, books and other sources. Includes all data from American Humanities Index and Humanities International Index plus other full text content.

[Grove Art Online](#)

Grove Art Online provides the entire text of *The Dictionary of Art* (34 vols., 1996), and *The Oxford Companion to Western Art*, (2001). There are over 3,000 thumbnail art images and line drawings displayed in the text of articles and links to over 40,000 art images on museum and gallery web sites.

Provides online access to most Oxford journals. Includes well over a dozen historical journals.

[Blackwell Synergy](#)

Although the emphasis is on science journals, Blackwell Synergy provides a social science and humanities collection, which include nearly 20 journals that cover historical topics. All articles

are available in PDF format.

[Gale Virtual Reference Library](#)

This database includes searchable encyclopedias and dictionaries, such as *Encyclopedia of Modern Europe* (5 v.), *Berkshire Encyclopedia of World History* (5v), *Encyclopedia of Russian History* (4v.), and more.

[ACLS Humanities E-Book](#)

The American Council of Learned Societies provides this searchable database of humanities e-books. This is a digital collection of over 1,700 full-text titles. Browse or search by title, author, subject, or keyword.

"Published annually since 1972, the Historic Documents Series now contains 32 volumes of primary sources. Each volume includes approximately one hundred documents covering the most significant events of the year. These documents range from presidential speeches, international agreements, and Supreme Court decisions to U.S. governmental reports, scientific findings, and cultural discussions." Browse by title, topic, or index term or search the database.

This database is an index to letters, diaries, oral histories, and other personal narratives. It links to numerous free archives and depositories on the Web. The Sawyer Library purchased the five companion database collections from Alexander Street Press. These collections may be searched separately for valuable primary resources. The collections are: North American Women's Letters and Diaries, British and Irish Women's Letters and Diaries, The American Civil War: Letters and Diaries, Black Thought and Culture, and North American Immigrant Letters, Diaries, and Oral Histories.

REF.D11 .M39 1999

This four volume set, covering prehistory through 1998, includes 70,000 events. Entries range from art and economics to politics and science. Fully indexed.

[Concise Encyclopedia of the Italian Renaissance](#)

REF. DG445 .C66

Covers topics, such as art and architecture, politics, wars and treaties, economics, religion, literature, philosophy, music, and science of Italy from c. 1320 through c. 1600. Articles are signed and usually include a brief bibliography.

[Dictionary of the Middle Ages.](#) (13 vols.)

REF. D114 .D5 1982

These volumes include sometimes lengthy (10,000 words) and sometimes brief (100 words) articles describing all aspects of the Middle Ages (A.D. 500-1500). Articles contain extensive bibliographies and are signed.

Written for the general reader and the student, this dictionary provides a comprehensive account of facts and developments in the fields of history, politics, and international relations. Includes statesmen, military leaders, movements, treaties, and international organizations. There is a detailed entry for each sovereign country in the world.

This volume is divided into two parts: biographical entries and nation entries. Biographies include listings of books concerning the founder. Nation entries outline a country's history and list applicable biographies.

Articles are divided into 4 titles: Ancient and Medieval series, Modern European series, Worldwide Twentieth Century series, and American series. Each article within a given title consists of 4 sections: (1) Quick reference material, showing time, place, and key people; (2) Summary of events, a journalistic description of the event; (3) Pertinent literature, where scholarly works about the events are reviewed; and (4) Additional recommended reading, which lists annotated additional works.
