Summer Study Program 2022

Receive three law school credits, courses taught by Suffolk and Galway faculty.

Live in student housing on the campus of the National University of Ireland-Galway.

Arrive May 20, classes run May 23 through June 3, 2022.

In addition, there will be guest speakers and field trips to places of legal interest.

Students may do *just* the academic portion of the

program or stay in Ireland to do an externship for 6-8 weeks. It is also possible to do just the externship without the academic portion of the program.

All Suffolk Law students in good standing are eligible to attend; 1Ls and 2Ls welcome.

Because of the early completion date, attending the Galway program will not adversely affect your chances of participating in most US-based internships.

HOUSING

On campus housing is just steps away from class!

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Disability Rights in a Comparative Context Professor Sarah Boonin

This course will explore the fairly recent evolution of disability rights in international law ushered in widespread adoption of the U.N. Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities. The course will have a special focus on legal decision-making and autonomy of persons with disabilities. The course will begin with a brief examination of the key legal, social, and political constructs that define mental health and disability law in the U.S. and internationally. The course will then explore how the U.S. legal system – as compared to the Convention and Irish Law – define and treats autonomy and decision-making in the context of disability. Topics will include adult guardianships and its alternatives, legal planning tools, forced or coerced treatment, and civil commitment. Additional topics may be explored, depending on the expertise and interests of Irish experts and guest lecturers.

This course will involve a combination of lectures from the Professor, group discussions, and guest lectures from Irish scholars and lawyers to provide a comparative Irish perspective. Students will visit and speak with local disability advocates and providers. Students will be assessed based on class attendance and participation, participation in the field trip, and a take home examination to be completed after the conclusion of the course. The course will meet 5 times over two weeks during the Galway Study Abroad program, for two hours per meeting, plus one field trip. The meeting schedule may need to be adjusted depending on guest lecturers and field trips.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Lawyers, Guns (Runners), and Money (Laundering) Professor Jeff Pokorak

In this one-credit course, we will explore money laundering crimes as they intersect with illegal — and legal — "offshore" banking and banking secrecy laws. This will involve a look at the U.S. money laundering statute and the Banking Secrecy Act, the Restatement (Third) of Foreign Relations Law, and recent revelations from the Pandora Papers regarding international offshore accounts. Also, time allowing, we will look at banking scandals like BCCI, UBI, and the current Deutsche Bank issues.

GETTING THERE

Galway is a charming, bustling city on the west coast of Ireland. These days, its historic core is teeming with students and visitors. Galway is a gateway to many scenic attractions, including Connemara and the Cliffs of Moher in Clare. The National University of Ireland at Galway (where students will be studying) is a 15 minute walk from the city center; there is also a shuttle bus from the student housing in and out of town. There are plenty of bars and restaurants, and lots of Irish music. Known as the cultural capital of Ireland, Galway is accessible, walkable and very student-friendly.

Travel suggestions: You may fly into either Shannon Airport or Dublin Airport. Busses run frequently from Dublin Airport to Galway City Center, and tickets may be booked online through Citylink or GoBus. Busses also run, though less frequently, from Shannon Airport. Check bus schedules ahead of traveling.
