HBCU BINDING FULL-TUITION SCHOLARSHIP

Suffolk Law launched the Thaddeus Alexander Kitchener Scholarship to make law school more affordable for students who demonstrate the ability to succeed in law school but who may not otherwise receive merit-based scholarships.

The scholarship is named for Thaddeus Alexander Kitchener, who was the first student of color to graduate with a law degree from Suffolk Law.

The Kitchener Scholarship is just one of the efforts undertaken by Suffolk Law to expand access to law school to students from diverse and nontraditional backgrounds.

TO QUALIFY:

- Application must be received by **March 1**
- Student must be an HBCU undergraduate alum and be admitted to Suffolk Law
- Suffolk Law HBCU Full-Tuition Agreement must be **completed and adhered to** for full-tuition coverage

NOT READY TO COMMIT?

If you received your Bachelor's from an HBCU and are admitted to Suffolk Law, you can still earn a non-binding scholarship of:

- \$35,000 per year in the full-time program, or
- \$25,000 per year in the part-time evening program

HBCU SCHOLARSHIP FAQs

If I graduated from an HBCU, am I automatically granted admission to Suffolk Law?

No, you must apply and be admitted into Suffolk Law in order to receive the HBCU scholarship.

Which application should I submit?

If you are applying for the binding full-tuition scholarship, you should submit the "HBCU Binding" application.

If you are **not** applying for the binding full-tuition scholarship, you should submit the appropriate application based on what program you are applying to.
