01:23 and the best ever employment outcomes for our graduates.

01:31 he has never forgotten his roots.

01:33 He, like so many Suffolk Law students past and present,

01:38 came from a family that valued education.

01:42 Both he and Ann have long recognized

01:45 the ways in which higher education can fuel success

01:49 in people's lives and careers.

01:52 For this reason,

01:53 they have consistently sought to pave the way

01:56 for others to pursue higher education themselves,  
01:59 especially those who have fewer financial resources.

02:06 that they have created the George Keches Scholarship Fund  
02:09 to support law students who are from Massachusetts,

02:24 in honor of George's friend and Suffolk Law alum, Tom Healy.  
02:28 George and Ann, your stories  
02:31 are the reason we do the work here at Suffolk Law.  
02:35 So on behalf of Suffolk University Law School,  
02:37 it is our honor to be naming this room after you,  
02:42 and we are deeply grateful for your support  
02:45 which will be changing the lives  
02:47 of Suffolk Law students for generations to come.

02:54 for now coming up to nearly 50 years.  
03:00 George and I have been friends,  
03:02 two of us, just young guys up in the state house,  
03:07 and knowing that if we worked hard  
03:11 we could potentially maximize our God given abilities.

03:19 he was actually going to Suffolk Law School  
03:21 as I was just a very, very, very new state representative  
03:27 on the judiciary committee in the state house.  
03:31 And I will tell you,  
03:32 right from the very beginning you could tell  
03:35 that George was special.  
03:37 George was smart. George had vision.

03:41 And so right from the very beginning,  
03:43 George and I became friends.  
03:45 And I just wanna tell you that over all of these years  
03:49 it's been my honor to be his friend  
03:55 and his partner in so many things.  
03:58 So I just wanna say to you, George, and to Ann,  
04:04 thank you for all you do  
04:05 to make our world a more just place in which to live.  
04:09 And in the spirit of passing this favor unto others,  
04:14 others like George and I who were the first people  
04:17 in our families to go to college, and to law school.

04:27 that anyone can pass on.  
04:30 And it's just so typical of George,  
04:33 that this is the way  
04:34 in which he would want to make a difference.

04:40 driven by their passion to level the playing field  
04:43 and ensure all have access to a legal education.

04:49 through their commitment to service and philanthropy.

10:42 because I had other obligations that needed supporting

10:47 and it was difficult to take that chance.

10:52 And she's been a wonderful partner, wife,
